Enhancing Your CourseWeb Site

- Many students will go to your CourseWeb page via the Schedule of Classes in order to learn more about your course.
- Your CourseWeb site already contains information from other campus databases, but you may enhance it.

Designing & Developing a Course Website

- In addition to your CourseWeb site,
- you may want to create an additional course website that supplements your classroom teaching,
- by giving students access to digitized course materials or having students do web-based assignments.
- There are several ways to do this. Although we often recommend beginning with a Learning Management System, most of the options described below can be combined in various ways.

Using a Learning Management System (LMS) Environment

- Learning management system tool kits, such as Blackboard and WebCT, help instructors
- create and organize course web pages;
- communicate with students via online discussion groups and chat rooms;
- manage online gradebooks and class lists;
- administer online surveys and exams;
- track student web site use;
- manage online course calendars; and much more.
- These tools are beginning to come of age, offering excellent features and increased ease of use.

Creating Customized Web Sites from Scratch

 In addition to making use of the features offered by a Learning Management System, you may want to add links to freeform web pages of your own creation.

Using New Communication Technologies

 Although the communication tools, such as Chat, that come built into the latest version of Blackboard are probably adequate to most needs, you can also try older, standalone internet tools, including Maillists, Web-based Maillist Archives, Listservers, Newsgroups, Chat Rooms, MOOs, and web loggers (i.e., bloggers).
